CLOSED SESSION ANNOUNCEMENT:

Rob Schultz: Prior to tonight's open session, the Board met in closed session to discuss personnel items under Government Code Section 54957. Specifically, the performance review for General Manager, Forrest Warren and Office Administrator Kim Allison. The Board took formal action and approved by motion that was seconded to give a merit increase to both Forrest Warren and Kim Allison.

Kim Karnes: Questioned the landscaping by CalTrans on State property.

Forrest Warren: We were requested to give them a water meter connection. I explained that was not possible because we are in a moratorium but that we could give them effluent water.

RESOLUTION NO. 98-250

A RESOLUTION OF THE SAN SIMEON COMMUNITY SERVICES DISTRICT ADOPTING AN EMPLOYEE SALARY SCHEDULE, POSITION CLASSIFICATIONS AND SALARY STEPS WITHIN THE RESPECTIVE RANGES FOR THE 1998-99 FISCAL YEAR

THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE SAN SIMEON COMMUNITY SERVICES DISTRICT DOES RESOLVE AS FOLLOWS:

WHEREAS, this Board deems it to be in the best interests of the San Simeon Community Services District and its various employees that minimum and maximum compensation be fixed as well as any District contributions to medical and retirement plans on behalf of the employee for various classifications of employment in the District as hereinafter provided.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the terms of the resolution shall be effective July 1,1998 and shall apply to the fiscal year 1998-99.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED this resolution shall supersede and repeal any position classifications.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the minimum compensation as of date of employment and the intermediate and maximum compensation for such employment shall be as hereinafter enumerated, effective July 1,1998, and that said employees shall be assigned to salary steps within the respective pay range of the position classification as set forth in Exhibit A, and further, that any contributions made by the District on behalf of the employee to medical and/or retirement programs shall be as set forth in Exhibit A, and further, that Exhibit A attached hereto is made a part hereof by reference, all of which are hereby adopted as follows:

ADMINISTRATION OF THE COMPENSATION PLAN

All full-time employees entering the employ of the District shall be paid at the first step of the salary range established for their classification unless authorized by the Board of Directors. Salary step increases, as provided herein, are not automatic, but based on performance and merit. Employees shall be placed on the step and qualify for increase in compensation for advancement to the next higher step of the pay ranges in the manner following:

1. Employees may qualify for advancement to the second step, after completion of six months service, upon the recommendation of District Manager and approval by the Board of Directors.

2. Employees may qualify for advancement to the third step, after the completion of one year of service in step two upon recommendation of and by the District Manager and approval by the Board of Directors.

3. Employees may qualify for advancement to the fourth step, after the completion of one year of service at the third step, upon recommendation of the District Manager and approval of the Board of Directors.

4. Employees may qualify for advancement to the fifth step, after completion of one year of service in step four, upon recommendation of the District Manager and approval of the Board of Directors.

5. A performance report on each employee recommended for advancement shall be submitted to the District Manager, prior to final action on such recommendation by the Board of Directors.

All part-time employees shall be paid without benefit of a salary range and at a rate or rates as specified in Exhibit A of the resolution.

A RESOLUTION OF THE SAN SIMEON COMMUNITY SERVICES DISTRICT ADOPTING AN EMPLOYEE SALARY SCHEDULE, POSITION CLASSIFICATIONS AND SALARY STEPS WITHIN THE RESPECTIVE RANGES FOR THE 1998-99 FISCAL YEAR

THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE SAN SIMEON COMMUNITY SERVICES DISTRICT DOES RESOLVE AS FOLLOWS:

WHEREAS, this Board deems it to be in the best interests of the San Simeon Community Services District and its various employees that minimum and maximum compensation be fixed as well as any District contributions to medical and retirement plans on behalf of the employee for various classifications of employment in the District as hereinafter provided.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the terms of the resolution shall be effective July 1,1998 and shall apply to the fiscal year 1998-99.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED this resolution shall supersede and repeal any position classifications.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the minimum compensation as of date of employment and the intermediate and maximum compensation for such employment shall be as hereinafter enumerated, effective July 1,1998, and that said employees shall be assigned to salary steps within the respective pay range of the position classification as set forth in Exhibit A, and further, that any contributions made by the District on behalf of the employee to medical and/or retirement programs shall be as set forth in Exhibit A, and further, that Exhibit A attached hereto is made a part hereof by reference, all of which are hereby adopted as follows:

ADMINISTRATION OF THE COMPENSATION PLAN

All full-time employees entering the employ of the District shall be paid at the first step of the salary range established for their classification unless authorized by the Board of Directors. Salary step increases, as provided herein, are not automatic, but based on performance and merit. Employees shall be placed on the step and qualify for increase in compensation for advancement to the next higher step of the pay ranges in the manner following:

1. Employees may qualify for advancement to the second step, after completion of six months service, upon the recommendation of District Manager and approval by the Board of Directors.

2. Employees may qualify for advancement to the third step, after the completion of one year of service in step two upon recommendation of and by the District Manager and approval by the Board of Directors.

3. Employees may qualify for advancement to the fourth step, after the completion of one year of service at the third step, upon recommendation of the District Manager and approval of the Board of Directors.

4. Employees may qualify for advancement to the fifth step, after completion of one year of service in step four, upon recommendation of the District Manager and approval of the Board of Directors.

5. A performance report on each employee recommended for advancement shall be submitted to the District Manager, prior to final action on such

recommendation by the Board of Directors.

All part-time employees shall be paid without benefit of a salary range and at a rate or rates as specified in Exhibit A of the resolution.

CANCELLATION OF WATER RIGHT APPLICATION 29588 OF SAN SIMEON ACRES COMMUNITY SERVICES DISTRICT-PICO CREEK TRIBUTARY TO PACIFIC OCEAN IN SAN LUIS OBISPO COUNTY

Enclosed is a Division of Water Rights (Division) Order canceling Application 29588 filed by the San Simeon Acres Community Services District (District). The purpose of this letter is to: (1) provide background information relating to the application, (2) provide an explanation for the cancellation of the application, and (3) describe alternative courses of action that are available the District.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION The District has an existing water right License (Application 19095, Permit 12465, License 12272) for the direct diversion of 0.27 cubic feet per second (maximum of 140 acre-feet per year) using two offset wells pumping from the underflow of Pico Creek. These wells supply water to a motel and approximately 200 homes and 400 people within the District's service area for domestic use.

The Division's letter to the District dated August 12, 1988, stated that the District was pumping in excess of the authorized amount and the District should file an application for an additional water right permit. In 1989, the District submitted Application 29588 that requested the right to directly divert 8,927 gallons per day (10 acre-feet per year), on a year-round basis, for domestic use using an offset well pumping from the underflow of Pico Creek. The proposed well would be located about 2,000 feet upstream of the existing wells. Information submitted by the District indicates that the application would provide a water right to meet existing demand and "back-up" water supply if high chloride concentrations due to saltwater intrusion contaminate the District's existing wells.

The Division distributed a notice of the application to interested parties in 1991 and protests were accepted from the California Department of Fish and Game, the California Coastal Commission, the California Sportfishing Protection Alliance, the Audubon Society, the Hearst Corporation and

California Environmental Protection Agency

two out of state universities. The protests are based on injury to prior rights and adverse environmental impacts, including impacts to fishery resources and other sensitive species.

The Division has sent numerous letters to the District requesting that the District take specific actions to perfect the application. A brief chronology of correspondence follows:

- 2/19/91 In response to the District's letter, the Division granted the District's request to suspend the processing of the application, pending the outcome of a feasibility study of a groundwater barrier project.
- 7/8/91 The District, as lead agency under California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), distributed a Notice of Preparation of an environmental document for a hydraulic saltwater barrier and water reclamation project.
- 5/11/92 The Division advised the District to resume negotiations with the protestants.
- District letter providing information regarding the status of the feasibility study and again requested a delay in processing the application.
- 12/15/92 Division letter granting the District's request but urged the District to complete the environmental studies and to resolve protests.
- 4/26/94 Division letter commenting on the scope of the Environmental Impact Report (EIR) and water right requirements.
- 5/16/94 Division letter suggesting that the District withdraw their application in light of the success of an aggressive water conservation program.
- 6/10/94 District letter requesting that the application not be cancelled, pending the outcome of studies relating to a joint desalination studies with the City of Cambria.
- 7/13/94 Division letter stating that the application will not be cancelled, but stating that the District must demonstrate that they are diligently working to resolve the protests and complete the environmental document.
- 8/4/95 Division letter requesting the status of negotiation of protests.
- 1/17/96 Division letter requesting a project schedule and specific information about status of environmental studies, otherwise the application will be cancelled.

California Environmental Protection Agency

- 2/12/96 District letter stating that the District is continuing with a joint desalination project with the City of Cambria, however, the project may not be feasible. A decision from the District was anticipated by mid summer of 1996.
- 8/27/97 Division letter requesting a project schedule and specific information about status of environmental studies.
- Division letter requesting information on: (1) project, (2) a proposed schedule for dealing with the outstanding protests, and (3) a survey protocol to assess Endangered Species Act (ESA) issues and (4) a schedule for completion of the survey. The letter states that if information is not received within 60 days, the application will be cancelled without further notice.
- District letter requesting additional time to explore other options and stating that the District has no plans to actively deal with the outstanding protests until the end of 1998..

DIVISION REQUIREMENTS The Division must act on an application for a water right permit in accordance with provisions of the California Water Code, CEQA, and the State and Federal Endangered Species Acts (ESA). As the applicant, the District will be required to comply with several provisions of the Water Code, CEQA and ESA.

<u>CEQA</u> The District, as lead agency under CEQA, must prepare an EIR for diversions from Pico Creek. Comments by the California Department of Fish and Game (DFG) state that "Pico Creek provides one of the most diverse and high quality wetlands on the south central coast." In addition, protests submitted by DFG and other parties state that the creek and estuary provide valuable habitat for several sensitive species including the tidewater goby, southwestern pond turtle, red-legged frog, two-striped garter snake, and steelhead trout. Several of these species have recently been added to the state and federal listing of threatened or endangered species. Completion of an EIR will require substantial time and will be costly.

<u>ESA</u> The District will have to comply with federal ESA requirements, which prohibit the "taking" of threatened or endangered species. This may require that the District prepare a Habitat Conservation Plan. The District should contact representatives from the National Marine Fisheries Service and the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service to obtain additional information relating to *federal* ESA requirements. The District should also contact representatives from the DFG to obtain additional information relating to *state* ESA requirements.

Water Availability Study Water Code section 1375 (d) requires that the Division assure that water is available for appropriation. Water Code section 1260(k), which became effective on

January 1, 1998, requires that the District complete a study that demonstrates that water is available for appropriation. The water availability study to be prepared by the District must consider the instream flow required to protect the fish, wildlife and other sensitive species. In addition, the water availability study must consider the potential impact that additional diversions could have on groundwater overdraft and the resulting saltwater intrusion.

<u>Protests</u> As described to you in numerous letters, all protests must be resolved before the Division can issue a water right permit. The six protests against Application 29588 raised numerous issues relating to: potential injury to prior rights (Hearst Corporation), permitting requirements (California Coastal Commission), potential injury to public trust resources (DFG, CSPA, and the Universities), water quality impacts (Audubon Society). If the District is unable to resolve the protests through negotiations with the parties, the Division would hold a field investigation and then prepare a Division decision, in accordance with Section 1345 of the Water Code. The Division would not conduct an investigation until the District completed a draft EIR.

JUSTIFICATION FOR CANCELLATION The Water Code requires that an applicant proceed with diligence in perfecting a water right. The record clearly indicates that, after ten years, the District has made little or no progress. The Division requested specific information in February 1998 and the District's response did not provide this information. Accordingly, the Division has cancelled this application based on the District's failure to proceed with the preparation of an EIR in a diligent manner, failure to meet with the protestants in an effort to resolve the protests, and failure to affirmatively respond to the Division's request for information as authorized by Water Code section 1275.

It should be noted that this application is cancelled without prejudice, which means that the District can submit another application at any time in the future. It should also be noted that there are no other pending applications within the Pico Creek watershed. Consequently, the District would not lose any water right priority to other water users. Furthermore, the SWRCB can assign higher priority to a municipal use, if and when there are competing water right applications.

ALTERNATIVE COURSES OF ACTION There are several alternative courses of action available to the District:

<u>Submit a new application</u> As described in your letter dated March 11, 1998, the District intends to evaluate several alternative methods of securing an additional supply of water. When the District has developed a feasible, cost-effective alternative, the District can submit an application for a water right permit for that specific project. The District must comply with the requirements described above.

<u>Conservation/Reclamation</u> The District could continue to develop and implement aggressive water conservation and reclamation programs to meet additional water demand.

<u>Groundwater</u> The District could construct a well that would pump percolating groundwater rather than pumping water from the underflow of Pico Creek. Pumping percolating groundwater does not require a water right permit by the SWRCB.

PETITION FOR RECONSIDERATION If the District disagrees with this order, the District can submit a petition for reconsideration, in accordance with section 768 et seq. of the California Code of Regulations (copy enclosed). There are four areas where a party may petition for reconsideration: (1) actions which prevented a party from having a fair hearing, (2) the decision is not supported by substantial evidence, (3) there is relevant evidence which, in the exercise of reasonable diligence, could not have been produced, and (4) error in Law.

UNAUTHORIZED DIVERSIONS Please note that diversion of water without a valid basis of right is considered a trespass against the state and may be subject to the imposition of Administrative Civil Liabilities of up to \$500 per day, in accordance with section 1052 of the Water Code. If the diversion is made under a claim of riparian or pre-1914 water rights, the applicant must file a Statement of Water Diversion and Use in accordance with section 5100 et seq. of the Water Code.

ORDINANCE NO.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE SAN SIMEON ACRES COMMUNITY SERVICES DISTRICT CONTINUING A MORATORIUM ON THE ISSUANCE OF WATER AND SEWER CONNECTIONS WITHIN THE BOUNDARIES OF THE DISTRICT

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Directors of the San Simeon Acres Community Services District ("District") as follows:

SECTION I. FINDINGS.

The Board of Directors of the District does hereby find, determine, and declare as follows:

- A. There currently exists a serious water quality and quantity problem within the boundaries of the District;
- B. There currently exists a moratorium on new sewer and water connections within the District originally established by Ordinance No. 61 and extended by Ordinance No. 63 to April 1, 1988. The intent of the Board of Directors by this Ordinance is to keep in effect said moratorium after the April 1, 1988, expiration date of Ordinance No. 63;
- C. The water quality and quantity problems of the District pose a current and immediate threat to the health and safety of the people within the District;
- D. The granting of additional water and sewer connections within the District contrary to the provisions of this ordinance would result in an immediate threat to the public health and safety;
- E. The District is diligently pursuing long term supplemental water supplies, but until the time when such supply is available, it is necessary to continue the existing moratorium.

SECTION II. MORATORIUM ON WATER AND SEWER CONNECTIONS.

Except as provided in Section IV of this Ordinance, the District shall shall not allow water and sewer connec-

tions or service on properties located within the boundaries of the District to serve any of the following:

- 1. Any new structure that will require new water or sewer service; or
- 2. Any expansion of an existing structure that will incorporate additional plumbing fixtures; or
- 3. Any expansion of an existing structure that will increase its potential for occupancy and demand for water or sewer.

SECTION III. DURATION OF MORATORIUM.

The provisions of this Ordinance shall remain in effect until repealed. This ordinance supersedes Ordinance No. 63.

SECTION IV. VESTED RIGHT EXEMPTION. The prohibition on new sewer or water connections provided in Section II of this Ordinance shall be inapplicable to projects receiving a vested rights exemption pursuant to Section 4 of District Ordinance No. 65.

SECTION V. CONSTITUTIONALITY.

If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or portion of this Ordinance is for any reason held to be invalid or unconstitutional by a Court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity or the constitutionality of the remaining portions of this Ordinance. The Board of Directors of the District hereby declares that it would have passed this Ordinance and each section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or portion thereof irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, sentences, clauses, phrases or portions be declared invalid or unconstitutional.

SECTION VI. EFFECTIVE DATE OF ORDINANCE.

This Ordinance shall be in full force immediately upon passage and within fifteen (15) days thereof shall be

published at least once in a newspaper of general circulation in the County of San Luis Obispo, California.

AFTER REVIEWING THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS OF THE DISTRICT FOR THE LAST TEN YEARS, I FOUND THAT THE DISTRICT HAD AN OPERATING INCOME IN ONLY TWO OF THOSE YEARS.

THOSE YEARS WERE 1997* (AFTER THE 1996 INCREASE RATE) AND 1988.

IN 1990 AND 1995 THE DISTRICT HAD TO DIP INTO THEIR RESERVES IN THE AMOUNT OF \$94,268.00 EVEN WITH THE INCOME FROM THE INTEREST FOR L.A.I.F.

THE ONE ITEM THAT HAS SAVED THE DISTRICT FROM YEARLY DEFICITS IS THE INTEREST FROM THE L.A.I.F. ACCOUNT.

IF THE DISTRICT PLANS TO CONTINUES TO USE THESE L.A.I.F. FUNDS FOR INFRASTRUCTURE, THE INTEREST WILL NOT BE THERE TO CARRY THE DISTRICT.

THIS YEAR THE BOARD SET ASIDE \$549,600 FOR PROJECTS, THE DISTRICT HAS A TOTAL OF \$1,255,350.85 RESERVED FOR SPECIFIC PROJECTS INCLUDING SUCH ITEMS AS UPGRADING THE WATER DISTRIBUTION SYTEM AND NEW WATER SOURCE. (SEE THE QUARTERLY INVESTMENT REPORT FOR SEPT. 30, 1998)

THIS DOESN'T INCLUDE FUNDS FOR UPGRADING THE WASTEWATER PLANT (SEE KENNY/JENKS WASTEWATER TREATEMENT PLANT FLOW CAPACITY STUDY)

THE DISTRICT'S INFRASTRUCTURE IS GETTING OLD AND WILL NEED CONSTANT MAINTENANCE AND UPKEEP. THAT COST WILL IMPACT ON THE INTEREST RECEIVED. EXPENSES WILL RISE INCOME WILL DROP.

*ALTHOUGH THE 1997 OPERATING INCOME WAS \$80,434.00. IF YOU LOOK AT THE DETAILS, REPAIRS AND MAINTENANCE FOR EXAMPLE WAS DOWN APPROXIMATELY \$46,000 FROM THE PRECEDING YEARS. 1997 WASN'T A NORMAL YEAR WITH ALL THE CHANGES WITH THE NEW BOARD. THE ENGINEER FEES WERE DOWN BECAUSE OF IT ALSO. IF IT HAD BEEN A NORMAL YEAR I DO NOT BELIEVE THE WE WOULD BE AT EVEN A \$40,000. OPERATING INCOME.

INCREASES IN THE NUMBER OF PROJECTS WILL USE THIS AMOUNT UP VERY QUICKLY. MORE EXPENSES FOR THE ENGINEER, ATTORNEY AND STAFF TIME IN GENERAL HAVE OCCURRED IN THIS LAST QUARTER THAN WERE BUDGETTED MAINLY BECAUSE WE HAVE BEEN PRECEDING FORWARD ON PROJECTS ETC.



DISCUSSION:

The Hearst Drive and San Simeon Avenue Water Line Replacement Project consists of replacing 1500 linear feet of an old/undersized asbestos cement water line, installing a new fire hydrant and reconnecting services and other fire hydrants adjacent to the project. Drawings are attached showing the general limits of this project.

On January 20, 1998, the Board authorized staff to solicit bids for the construction of the project. Due to concerns with the detour generated from the Highway One/Pico Bridge Project and the potential of the inconvenience to tourist traffic, it was decided to postpone construction until now

The District received five bids, with the Sanchez Company of Paso Robles the apparent low bidder for all of the work at total cost of \$78,500. The high bid received was \$117,250. A bid summary and construction schedule are attached for Board review and consideration.

FUNDING:

Funds in the amount of \$80,000 for the construction of this project has been provided for under the Water Project Fund No. W-5 for the FY 1998/99 budget. The Engineer's estimate for construction is \$68,500. Given the construction staking, inspection and need for contingencies, an additional \$10,000 should be transferred to provide for a budget of \$90,000.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

It is recommended that the Board;

- 1. Award the bid to the Sanchez Company, of Paso Robles, California for \$78,500.
- 2. Transfer \$10,000 from reserves to provide for a total construction budget of \$90,000.


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

Proposal for the Emergency Ocean Outfall Repairs

DISCUSSION:

An underwater video inspection was made by Underwater Resources Inc., (URI) on Monday, September 28th and 29th, to investigate the condition of the District's 8-inch ductile iron ocean outfall line and diffusers (URI, Report attached). The video revealed excessive scaling and corrosion on the 4-inch steel flanges. The bolts mounting the old diffusers have been completely eaten away the old diffusers lay in the sand adjacent to the pipeline.

The original outfall piping and appurtenances do not have a cathodic protection system. Because the outfall pipe is ductile iron and the diffuser components are metallic, the line will continue to be subject to the attack of the corrosive elements.

URI will submit a proposal to install four new 4-inch high density polyethylene (HDPE) flanges with stainless steel straps and nylon nuts and bolts, as shown on the attached schematic. Also, URI proposes to install a cathodic protection system slowing the corrosive effects of the outfall structure.

Each 4-inch diffuser collar is fabricated from stainless steel and will include a flexable neoprene flap to keep the ports from sanding. The hydraulic gradient exerts a total pressure of approximately 3 psi. The neoprene flap will be adjustable so that it will open with very little pressure therefore, a dry test is recommended prior to installation.

The 4-inch steel flange with the greatest amount of corrosion on the end of the outfall will be plugged with a plastic pressure plug and replaced with a new assembly as shown on the schematic.

On October 5, 1998, the California Regional Water Quality Control Board sent the District written correspondence (attached) ordering repairs as soon as possible, otherwise they will consider enforcement action.

FUNDING:

Funds in the amount of \$51,000 for the repair of the outfall line is provided under S-5 from the FY 1998/99 budget.

It is not known at this time how much the repairs will cost, but by installing the new diffusers onto three of the existing flanges, costs will be reduced much more than anticipated.


A preliminary construction cost estimate of \$30,000 has been prepared for this work including installation of the sacrificial anodes, and is attached for Board review and consideration.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

It is recommended that the Board;

- 1. Designate the ocean outfall repairs as an emergency project and;
- 2. Direct staff to work with Underwater Resources Inc. and others to solicit a proposal to repair the outfall diffusers and;
- 3. Direct staff and the Board Chairman to authorize work (within the budgeted amount) to make the necessary repairs.

Sanitary Ocean Outfall Inspection

Summary of Inspection

On September 26th and 29th, Underwater Resources performed a close visual and video inspection of the outfall diffusers and exposed pipeline offshore of the San Simeon Waste Treatment Plant. This pipeline and diffuser configuration is used in the plant's treated water disbursement out into the Pacific Ocean. The Outfall was inspected in order to determine the extent of damage and general condition after a dye test was used to determine the location of the end of the outfall and a potential break. The first dye test (done before URI was called), indicated said potential break. A second dye test was performed with URI onsite, and only one dye plume was noted (diffusers).

A previous inspection showed outfall to be 100% exposed and laying on rock/bedrock/rip-rap. The second inspection by URI, approximately one year later shows a substantial amount of sand has moved in and covered most of the 8" pipe and partially covered the 4" diffuser ports, endgate and anchor sled.

Overall Condition of Pipe

The overall condition of the pipeline is poor in regards to corrosion and the apparent lack of cathodic protection. No obvious breaks/cracks were found however. It is suspected that the material is Ductile Iron, with Ball and Socket Joints (lacking botts). This is typical to the plants topside piping. Joints inspected appeared to be in acceptable condition for the purpose they were intended to be used for. Overall corrosion however was moderate to severe, where a considerable amount of scale and oxide was readily removed with a hammer. Original wall thickness is unknown.

Condition of Diffuser #1

Moderate corrosion and scale was found and no fispper device was noted. A bare fisings remains with no protection from send encroachment. However due to the water flow coming from the plant this diffuser was flowing at the time of the inspection. A small amount of sand was found inside the 8" pipe. After jetting most of the sand was removed or moved away from the diffuser opening.

Condition of Diffuser #2

Moderate to heavy corrosion was found on this diffuser, with severe damage to the sealing surface due to corrosion and scale. Before jetting, no water flow was noted, and a substantial amount of sand and rock was plugging the 4" port to the point of overflowing out of the port. No flapper or other means to cover the orifice was found, as in diffuser one. After jetting, water flow was restored.



Condition of Diffuser #3

Moderate to heavy corrosion was found on this diffuser, with severe damage to the sealing surface due to corrosion and scale. Before jetting, no water flow was noted, and a substantial amount of sand and rock was plugging the 4" port to the point of overflowing out of the port. No flapper or other means to cover the orifice was found, as in diffuser one and two. After jetting, water flow was restored.

Condition of Diffuser #4


Heavy to severe corrosion was found on this diffuser, with severe damage to the sealing surface due to comesion and scale. Also noted was the metal loss in the flange of no less than 4 bolt holes. Before jetting, no water flow was noted, and a substantial amount of sand and rock was plugging the 4" port to the point of overflowing out of the port. No flapper or other means to cover the orifice was found, as in diffuser one and two. After jetting, water flow was restored.


Summary

After jetting, water flow was found on all four diffusers. Due to the mobility rock and sand, and the lack of checks for these ports, they are not likely to stay open for long. Diffuser #4 would be difficult to retrofit a flapper assembly, but #1, #2 and #3 could be done with a minimal effort. It is also recommended that a secrificial anode system be designed by cathodic protection (Harco/Compro) engineers in order to minimize any future corrosion of the pipeline and any retrofit ferrous material installed. Size and piacement of anode system will depend upon the duration and area of pipeline to be protected.






COLFALL DIFFUSER CONFIGURATION

SUBJECT:

Equalization Basin Cover and Odor Control

DISCUSSION:

Staff has been instructed to look at the feasibility of covering the 32-foot by 42-foot equalization tank at the wastewater treatment plant and providing an air scrubber in order to reduce potential orders to adjacent properties. Superintendent Head and engineering staff have investigated several approaches to covering the basin.

Those alternatives include:

- 1. A permanent cover constructed of either reinforced fiberglass plastic or rectangular trussed aluminum. The scrubber unit would be permanently fastened to the roof structure.
- 2. Temporary nylon tarp attached to the walls. A in-house scrubber would be constructed.

Although a temporary tarp is a much lower cost alternate, operations staff felt that there would be problems that could make this cover deteriorate very quickly.

FUNDING:

Funds in the amount of \$55,000 for the cover over the equalization basin and the installation of an air scrubber for odor control is provided under Identified Sewer Projects S-8 of the FY 1998/99 budget. Estimated costs for the several alternatives are attached.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

It is recommended that the Board;

- 1. Consider the estimated costs and presentation by staff of the different methods available to cover the tank
- 2. If a temporary cover is selected, direct staff to purchase and install this equipment.
- 3. If a permanent cover is selected, direct staff to prepare a bid sheet for equipment procurement from various manufactures and bring bids back for further Board action.

Dear Mr. Briggs:

In response to your letter dated October 5, 1998, to Mr. Ron Head, the District is diligently pursuing repairs of the subject outfall line.

Since the last correspondence from Mr. Head dated October 9, 1998, we have completed the video inspection of the outfall line and have received a written report (attached) from the contractor, Underwater Resources Inc. That video revealed the extent of damages to the outfall line and a method of repair.

The Board of Directors met on the matter on October 14, 1998, to discuss the method of repairs and to authorize funding for the project. The Board directed staff to proceed with the repairs.

District staff is proposing to utilize three of the existing flanges and attach a neoprene flap gate on each diffuser. In addition, we will be installing a new diffuser by "hot tapping" a High Density Polyethylene flange to the 8-inch ductile iron pipeline by using stainless steel straps and bolts. A sketch has been provided as part of the referenced report for your information.

Because the existing outfall pipe and appurtenances may continue to corrode, the repair will also include the installation of sacrificial anodes to the line for cathodic protection.

SUBJECT:

Hearst Drive/San Simeon Avenue Water Line Replacement - Bid Results

DISCUSSION:

The Hearst Drive and San Simeon Avenue Water Line Replacement Project consists of replacing 1500 linear feet of an old/undersized asbestos cement water line, installing a new fire hydrant and reconnecting services and other fire hydrants adjacent to the project. Drawings are attached showing the general limits of this project.

On January 20, 1998, the Board authorized staff to solicit bids for the construction of the project. Due to concerns with the detour generated from the Highway One/Pico Bridge Project and the potential of the inconvenience to tourist traffic, it was decided to postpone construction until now.

The District received five bids, with the Sanchez Company of Paso Robles the apparent low bidder for all of the work at total cost of \$78,500. The high bid received was \$117,250. A bid summary and construction schedule are attached for Board review and consideration.

FUNDING:

Funds in the amount of \$80,000 for the construction of this project has been provided for under the Water Project Fund No. W-5 for the FY 1998/99 budget. The Engineer's estimate for construction is \$68,500. Given the construction staking, inspection and need for contingencies, an additional \$10,000 should be transferred to provide for a budget of \$90,000.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

It is recommended that the Board;

- 1. Award the bid to the Sanchez Company, of Paso Robles, California for \$78,500.
- 2. Transfer \$10,000 from reserves to provide for a total construction budget of \$90,000.





A RESOLUTION OF THE SAN SIMEON COMMUNITY SERVICES DISTRICT ADOPTING AN EMPLOYEE SALARY SCHEDULE, POSITION CLASSIFICATIONS AND SALARY STEPS WITHIN THE RESPECTIVE RANGES FOR THE 1998-99 FISCAL YEAR

THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE SAN SIMEON COMMUNITY SERVICES DISTRICT DOES RESOLVE AS FOLLOWS:

WHEREAS, this Board deems it to be in the best interests of the San Simeon Community Services District and its various employees that minimum and maximum compensation be fixed as well as any District contributions to medical and retirement plans on behalf of the employee for various classifications of employment in the District as hereinafter provided.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the terms of the resolution shall be effective July 1,1998 and shall apply to the fiscal year 1998-99.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED this resolution shall supersede and repeal any position classifications.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the minimum compensation as of date of employment and the intermediate and maximum compensation for such employment shall be as hereinafter enumerated, effective July 1,1998, and that said employees shall be assigned to salary steps within the respective pay range of the position classification as set forth in Exhibit A, and further, that any contributions made by the District on behalf of the employee to medical and/or retirement programs shall be as set forth in Exhibit A, and further, that Exhibit A attached hereto is made a part hereof by reference, all of which are hereby adopted as follows:

ADMINISTRATION OF THE COMPENSATION PLAN

All full-time employees entering the employ of the District shall be paid at the first step of the salary range established for their classification unless authorized by the Board of Directors. Salary step increases, as provided herein, are not automatic, but based on performance and merit. Employees shall be placed on the step and qualify for increase in compensation for advancement to the next higher step of the pay ranges in the manner following:

1. Employees may qualify for advancement to the second step, after completion of six months service, upon the recommendation of District Manager and approval by the Board of Directors.

2. Employees may qualify for advancement to the third step, after the completion of one year of service in step two upon recommendation of and by the District Manager and approval by the Board of Directors.

3. Employees may qualify for advancement to the fourth step, after the completion of one year of service at the third step, upon recommendation of the District Manager and approval of the Board of Directors.

4. Employees may qualify for advancement to the fifth step, after completion of one year of service in step four, upon recommendation of the District Manager and approval of the Board of Directors.

5. A performance report on each employee recommended for advancement shall be submitted to the District Manager, prior to final action on such recommendation by the Board of Directors.

All part-time employees shall be paid without benefit of a salary range and at a rate or rates as specified in Exhibit A of the resolution.

CANCELLATION OF WATER RIGHT APPLICATION 29588 OF SAN SIMEON ACRES COMMUNITY SERVICES DISTRICT-PICO CREEK TRIBUTARY TO PACIFIC OCEAN IN SAN LUIS OBISPO COUNTY

Enclosed is a Division of Water Rights (Division) Order canceling Application 29588 filed by the San Simeon Acres Community Services District (District). The purpose of this letter is to: (1) provide background information relating to the application, (2) provide an explanation for the cancellation of the application, and (3) describe alternative courses of action that are available the District.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION The District has an existing water right License (Application 19095, Permit 12465, License 12272) for the direct diversion of 0.27 cubic feet per second (maximum of 140 acre-feet per year) using two offset wells pumping from the underflow of Pico Creek. These wells supply water to a motel and approximately 200 homes and 400 people within the District's service area for domestic use.

The Division's letter to the District dated August 12, 1988, stated that the District was pumping in excess of the authorized amount and the District should file an application for an additional water right permit. In 1989, the District submitted Application 29588 that requested the right to directly divert 8,927 gallons per day (10 acre-feet per year), on a year-round basis, for domestic use using an offset well pumping from the underflow of Pico Creek. The proposed well would be located about 2,000 feet upstream of the existing wells. Information submitted by the District indicates that the application would provide a water right to meet existing demand and "back-up" water supply if high chloride concentrations due to saltwater intrusion contaminate the District's existing wells.

The Division distributed a notice of the application to interested parties in 1991 and protests were accepted from the California Department of Fish and Game, the California Coastal Commission, the California Sportfishing Protection Alliance, the Audubon Society, the Hearst Corporation and

California Environmental Protection Agency

two out of state universities. The protests are based on injury to prior rights and adverse environmental impacts, including impacts to fishery resources and other sensitive species.

The Division has sent numerous letters to the District requesting that the District take specific actions to perfect the application. A brief chronology of correspondence follows:

- 2/19/91 In response to the District's letter, the Division granted the District's request to suspend the processing of the application, pending the outcome of a feasibility study of a groundwater barrier project.
- 7/8/91 The District, as lead agency under California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), distributed a Notice of Preparation of an environmental document for a hydraulic saltwater barrier and water reclamation project.
- 5/11/92 The Division advised the District to resume negotiations with the protestants.
- District letter providing information regarding the status of the feasibility study and again requested a delay in processing the application.
- 12/15/92 Division letter granting the District's request but urged the District to complete the environmental studies and to resolve protests.
- 4/26/94 Division letter commenting on the scope of the Environmental Impact Report (EIR) and water right requirements.
- 5/16/94 Division letter suggesting that the District withdraw their application in light of the success of an aggressive water conservation program.
- 6/10/94 District letter requesting that the application not be cancelled, pending the outcome of studies relating to a joint desalination studies with the City of Cambria.
- 7/13/94 Division letter stating that the application will not be cancelled, but stating that the District must demonstrate that they are diligently working to resolve the protests and complete the environmental document.
- 8/4/95 Division letter requesting the status of negotiation of protests.
- 1/17/96 Division letter requesting a project schedule and specific information about status of environmental studies, otherwise the application will be cancelled.

- 2/12/96 District letter stating that the District is continuing with a joint desalination project with the City of Cambria, however, the project may not be feasible. A decision from the District was anticipated by mid summer of 1996.
- 8/27/97 Division letter requesting a project schedule and specific information about status of environmental studies.
- Division letter requesting information on: (1) project, (2) a proposed schedule for dealing with the outstanding protests, and (3) a survey protocol to assess Endangered Species Act (ESA) issues and (4) a schedule for completion of the survey. The letter states that if information is not received within 60 days, the application will be cancelled without further notice.
- 3/11/98 District letter requesting additional time to explore other options and stating that the District has no plans to actively deal with the outstanding protests until the end of 1998..

DIVISION REQUIREMENTS The Division must act on an application for a water right permit in accordance with provisions of the California Water Code, CEQA, and the State and Federal Endangered Species Acts (ESA). As the applicant, the District will be required to comply with several provisions of the Water Code, CEQA and ESA.

<u>CEQA</u> The District, as lead agency under CEQA, must prepare an EIR for diversions from Pico Creek. Comments by the California Department of Fish and Game (DFG) state that "Pico Creek provides one of the most diverse and high quality wetlands on the south central coast." In addition, protests submitted by DFG and other parties state that the creek and estuary provide valuable habitat for several sensitive species including the tidewater goby, southwestern pond turtle, red-legged frog, two-striped garter snake, and steelhead trout. Several of these species have recently been added to the state and federal listing of threatened or endangered species. Completion of an EIR will require substantial time and will be costly.

<u>ESA</u> The District will have to comply with federal ESA requirements, which prohibit the "taking" of threatened or endangered species. This may require that the District prepare a Habitat Conservation Plan. The District should contact representatives from the National Marine Fisheries Service and the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service to obtain additional information relating to *federal* ESA requirements. The District should also contact representatives from the DFG to obtain additional information relating to *state* ESA requirements.

Water Availability Study Water Code section 1375 (d) requires that the Division assure that water is available for appropriation. Water Code section 1260(k), which became effective on

January 1, 1998, requires that the District complete a study that demonstrates that water is available for appropriation. The water availability study to be prepared by the District must consider the instream flow required to protect the fish, wildlife and other sensitive species. In addition, the water availability study must consider the potential impact that additional diversions could have on groundwater overdraft and the resulting saltwater intrusion.

<u>Protests</u> As described to you in numerous letters, all protests must be resolved before the Division can issue a water right permit. The six protests against Application 29588 raised numerous issues relating to: potential injury to prior rights (Hearst Corporation), permitting requirements (California Coastal Commission), potential injury to public trust resources (DFG, CSPA, and the Universities), water quality impacts (Audubon Society). If the District is unable to resolve the protests through negotiations with the parties, the Division would hold a field investigation and then prepare a Division decision, in accordance with Section 1345 of the Water Code. The Division would not conduct an investigation until the District completed a draft EIR.

JUSTIFICATION FOR CANCELLATION The Water Code requires that an applicant proceed with diligence in perfecting a water right. The record clearly indicates that, after ten years, the District has made little or no progress. The Division requested specific information in February 1998 and the District's response did not provide this information. Accordingly, the Division has cancelled this application based on the District's failure to proceed with the preparation of an EIR in a diligent manner, failure to meet with the protestants in an effort to resolve the protests, and failure to affirmatively respond to the Division's request for information as authorized by Water Code section 1275.

It should be noted that this application is cancelled without prejudice, which means that the District can submit another application at any time in the future. It should also be noted that there are no other pending applications within the Pico Creek watershed. Consequently, the District would not lose any water right priority to other water users. Furthermore, the SWRCB can assign higher priority to a municipal use, if and when there are competing water right applications.

ALTERNATIVE COURSES OF ACTION There are several alternative courses of action available to the District:

<u>Submit a new application</u> As described in your letter dated March 11, 1998, the District intends to evaluate several alternative methods of securing an additional supply of water. When the District has developed a feasible, cost-effective alternative, the District can submit an application for a water right permit for that specific project. The District must comply with the requirements described above.

<u>Conservation/Reclamation</u> The District could continue to develop and implement aggressive water conservation and reclamation programs to meet additional water demand.

<u>Groundwater</u> The District could construct a well that would pump percolating groundwater rather than pumping water from the underflow of Pico Creek. Pumping percolating groundwater does not require a water right permit by the SWRCB.

PETITION FOR RECONSIDERATION If the District disagrees with this order, the District can submit a petition for reconsideration, in accordance with section 768 et seq. of the California Code of Regulations (copy enclosed). There are four areas where a party may petition for reconsideration: (1) actions which prevented a party from having a fair hearing, (2) the decision is not supported by substantial evidence, (3) there is relevant evidence which, in the exercise of reasonable diligence, could not have been produced, and (4) error in Law.

UNAUTHORIZED DIVERSIONS Please note that diversion of water without a valid basis of right is considered a trespass against the state and may be subject to the imposition of Administrative Civil Liabilities of up to \$500 per day, in accordance with section 1052 of the Water Code. If the diversion is made under a claim of riparian or pre-1914 water rights, the applicant must file a Statement of Water Diversion and Use in accordance with section 5100 et seq. of the Water Code.

ORDINANCE NO.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE SAN SIMEON ACRES COMMUNITY SERVICES DISTRICT CONTINUING A MORATORIUM ON THE ISSUANCE OF WATER AND SEWER CONNECTIONS WITHIN THE BOUNDARIES OF THE DISTRICT

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Directors of the San Simeon Acres Community Services District ("District") as follows:

SECTION I. FINDINGS.

The Board of Directors of the District does hereby find, determine, and declare as follows:

- A. There currently exists a serious water quality and quantity problem within the boundaries of the District;
- B. There currently exists a moratorium on new sewer and water connections within the District originally established by Ordinance No. 61 and extended by Ordinance No. 63 to April 1, 1988. The intent of the Board of Directors by this Ordinance is to keep in effect said moratorium after the April 1, 1988, expiration date of Ordinance No. 63;
- C. The water quality and quantity problems of the District pose a current and immediate threat to the health and safety of the people within the District;
- D. The granting of additional water and sewer connections within the District contrary to the provisions of this ordinance would result in an immediate threat to the public health and safety;
- E. The District is diligently pursuing long term supplemental water supplies, but until the time when such supply is available, it is necessary to continue the existing moratorium.

SECTION II. MORATORIUM ON WATER AND SEWER CONNECTIONS.

Except as provided in Section IV of this Ordinance, the District shall shall not allow water and sewer connec-

tions or service on properties located within the boundaries of the District to serve any of the following:

- 1. Any new structure that will require new water or sewer service; or
- 2. Any expansion of an existing structure that will incorporate additional plumbing fixtures; or
- 3. Any expansion of an existing structure that will increase its potential for occupancy and demand for water or sewer.

SECTION III. DURATION OF MORATORIUM.

The provisions of this Ordinance shall remain in effect until repealed. This ordinance supersedes Ordinance No. 63.

SECTION IV. VESTED RIGHT EXEMPTION. The prohibition on new sewer or water connections provided in Section II of this Ordinance shall be inapplicable to projects receiving a vested rights exemption pursuant to Section 4 of District Ordinance No. 65.

SECTION V. CONSTITUTIONALITY.

If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or portion of this Ordinance is for any reason held to be invalid or unconstitutional by a Court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity or the constitutionality of the remaining portions of this Ordinance. The Board of Directors of the District hereby declares that it would have passed this Ordinance and each section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or portion thereof irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, sentences, clauses, phrases or portions be declared invalid or unconstitutional.

SECTION VI. EFFECTIVE DATE OF ORDINANCE.

This Ordinance shall be in full force immediately upon passage and within fifteen (15) days thereof shall be

published at least once in a newspaper of general circulation in the County of San Luis Obispo, California.

THOSE YEARS WERE 1997* (AFTER THE 1996 INCREASE RATE) AND 1988.

IN 1990 AND 1995 THE DISTRICT HAD TO DIP INTO THEIR RESERVES IN THE AMOUNT OF \$94,268.00 EVEN WITH THE INCOME FROM THE INTEREST FOR L.A.I.F.

THE ONE ITEM THAT HAS SAVED THE DISTRICT FROM YEARLY DEFICITS IS THE INTEREST FROM THE L.A.I.F. ACCOUNT.

IF THE DISTRICT PLANS TO CONTINUES TO USE THESE L.A.I.F. FUNDS FOR INFRASTRUCTURE, THE INTEREST WILL NOT BE THERE TO CARRY THE DISTRICT.

THIS YEAR THE BOARD SET ASIDE \$549,600 FOR PROJECTS, THE DISTRICT HAS A TOTAL OF \$1,255,350.85 RESERVED FOR SPECIFIC PROJECTS INCLUDING SUCH ITEMS AS UPGRADING THE WATER DISTRIBUTION SYTEM AND NEW WATER SOURCE. (SEE THE QUARTERLY INVESTMENT REPORT FOR SEPT. 30, 1998)

THIS DOESN'T INCLUDE FUNDS FOR UPGRADING THE WASTEWATER PLANT (SEE KENNY/JENKS WASTEWATER TREATEMENT PLANT FLOW CAPACITY STUDY)

THE DISTRICT'S INFRASTRUCTURE IS GETTING OLD AND WILL NEED CONSTANT MAINTENANCE AND UPKEEP. THAT COST WILL IMPACT ON THE INTEREST RECEIVED. EXPENSES WILL RISE INCOME WILL DROP.


*ALTHOUGH THE 1997 OPERATING INCOME WAS \$80,434.00. IF YOU LOOK AT THE DETAILS, REPAIRS AND MAINTENANCE FOR EXAMPLE WAS DOWN APPROXIMATELY \$46,000 FROM THE PRECEDING YEARS. 1997 WASN'T A NORMAL YEAR WITH ALL THE CHANGES WITH THE NEW BOARD. 

We understand several diffusers on the District's wastewater treatment plant's outfall line are plugged and are in need of immediate attention. If the diffusers are plugged they should be repaired, or replaced, as soon as possible. Winter storms can occur in early October and prevent divers from working on repairs. It has come to this Board's staff attention that divers inspected the outfall line and diffusers but did not make repairs. This Board's staff would like to point out that the District's failure to make needed repairs in an expeditious manner will be considered if enforcement action is needed.

Please send a written report to this office explaining the extent of the repairs needed and when they are to be made. This report is due prior to October 15, 1998. We look forward to working with you to insure the integrity of all treatment processes.

Reference is made to your letter (No. 98-50503-TW) dated September 16, 1998 for a Department of the Army Permit to construct a new pipe bridge immediately adjacent to the existing deteriorated pipe bridge. The replacement bridge would support replacement water and sewer lines as well as a new 6-inch reclaimed water line. All construction activities would be accomplished from the upper bank areas and no equipment would enter the creek. The area of disturbance would be approximately 150 square feet in an area of non-native vegetation above the high tide line. The pipe bridge would span Arroyo de Padre Juan Creek in San Simeon, San Luis Obispo County, California.

Based on the information furnished in your letter and during a telephone conversation with Ms. Tiffany Welch of my staff on September 23, 1998, we have determined that your proposed project does not discharge dredged or fill material into a water of the United States or an adjacent wetland. Therefore, the project is not subject to our jurisdiction under section 404 of the Clean Water Act and a section 404 permit is not required from our office. Further, the project is located above mean high water and would not affect the navigable capacity of the waterway. Therefore, the project is not subject to our jurisdiction under section 10 of the River and Harbor Act and a section 10 permit is not required from our office.

- (9) All transmission lines are placed underground and as close as possible to the freeway right-of-way boundary or at other locations authorized by the department.
- (10) The plans and specifications for the recycled water transmission facilities have been approved by the department prior to construction.
 - (d) As used in this section:
- (1) "Local public agency" means any local public agency which transmits or supplies recycled water to others.
- (2) "Water public utility" means any privately owned water corporation which is subject to the jurisdiction and control of the Public Utilities Commission.
- 92.4. Where a city street or county road abuts upon real property acquired by the state for freeway purposes, the department may contribute toward the cost of construction of the half of such street or road that directly fronts or abuts upon such property if such street or road was established, but not yet constructed, at the time when the location of such freeway was established by the commission.
- 92.5. The department shall install, in all tunnels and underpasses on state **highways** within metropolitan areas where the tunnel or underpass is of sufficient length to impede radio reception, wires, or other devices which will sustain reception of broadcasts by radios in vehicles traveling through the tunnels and underpasses.

The Legislature declares that the installation of such devices in state highway tunnels and underpasses is an improvement of highways within the meaning of Section 1 of Article XIX of the California Constitution since it will assist law enforcement officers in their patrol duties by enabling them to receive essential radio calls and also will increase the enjoyment of the people in the use of the state highways.

- 92.6. At such locations as shall be determined by the department to be appropriate, screening shall be installed and maintained on state freeway overpasses on which pedestrians are allowed, in order to prevent objects from being dropped or thrown upon vehicles passing underneath. First consideration shall be given to freeway overpasses in urban areas.
- 93. The department may construct and maintain **detours** as may be necessary to facilitate movement of traffic where state **highways** are closed or obstructed by construction or otherwise. The department may direct traffic onto any other public highway which will serve as a detour, in which case the department, upon the completion of such use, and upon the request of the local agency having jurisdiction over the highway, shall restore the same to its former condition; provided, that the local agency shall reimburse the department for the amount of all betterment to such highway caused by the restoration. The department shall also reimburse the local agency for all reasonable additional expenses incurred by that agency in maintaining said highway during the period of detour if such additional expenses were caused by said detour.
