4A. GENERAL MANAGER'S REPORT

April 8, 2015

1. Staff Activity - Report on Staff activities for the month of March.

During the month of March Staff read meters and distributed water billing and responded to multiple customer service calls. Staff made a wire transfer from the Money Marketing account to the USDA Account for payment of USDA loan of \$10,345.

Staff worked the County Energy Watch and PGE to Audit the equipment at the Plant and District office. Once paperwork is complete, Staff will review with the Board. Staff is waiting to hear from the USDA and the Water Board regarding grant funding for the RO Project.

2. Update - Wellhead treatment system project.

90% plans (design) were distributed to the Water Committee for review. Preparation of a CEQA exemption is in progress. Bid package for the RO unit is final, staff and Phoenix Engineering will be preparing the bid package for distribution to vendors. Obtained an electrical engineering proposal to complete the electrical design for the WHTP. The Geotechnical field survey was performed on April 1 at the WHTP site.

3. Update - Well 2 sanitary seal project.

Phoenix Engineering is coordinating a construction start date with Enloe Construction.

4. Update – Notice of Violation from Coastal Commission regarding Rip Rap, Ocean Outfall line and Ditch Cleaning.

Attended a conference call with Oliveira Consulting and the CCC regarding the NOV. The result of which generated several emails and follow up emails regarding the compliance history of the Wastewater Treatment Facility. Discussion of the current permit status of the ocean outfall line also took place via email.

- 1. Staff is working to collect documents to demonstrate equal division of ownership of the property adjacent to the WWTF.
- 2. Oliveira is currently preparing the Coastal Development Permit Application
- 3. The CCC is researching to determine if there was a formal response from the CCC after the SSCSD's May 7, 2008 CDP application submittal

Wastewater Treatment Plant

- All sampling, testing and reporting at the wastewater treatment plant and the recycled water facility was performed as required by the RWQCB.
- One load of sludge was hauled away this month.

Water Distribution System

- All routine sampling and testing was performed. The monthly report was submitted to the State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB), Division of Drinking Water (DDW).
- Monthly water meter reading was performed.
- Chloride levels are monitored daily throughout the system.
- Pico Creek flow is monitored periodically throughout the month.

District and Equipment Maintenance

- Staff continues with all of the scheduled preventive maintenance for all the equipment at the facilities. We are recording all of these activities.
- Weed abatement was performed on the district easement on Pico Ave and around all fire hydrants.

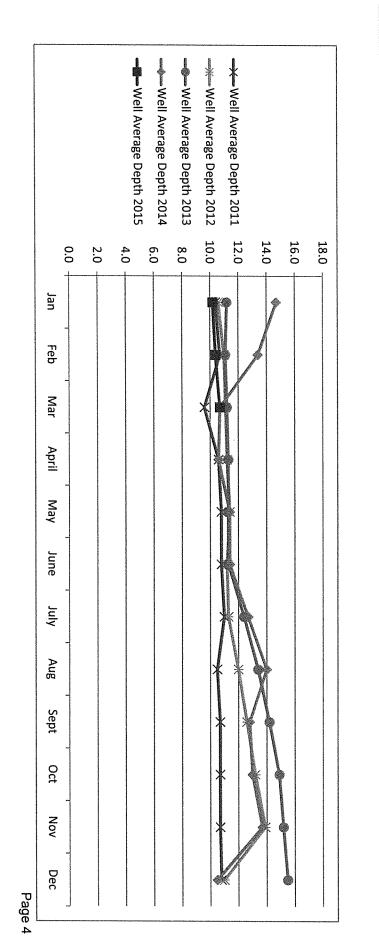

Attached is a proposal from IRJ Electrical Engineers to perform the electrical design for the Well Head Treatment Project. The scope of work is contained within IRJ's proposal. Staff recommends approval of the IRJ Well Head Treatment Project Electrical Engineering Proposal.

C. Consideration of adoption of a Resolution declaring a water shortage emergency and implementing a Stage Three Water Shortage pursuant to the District's Water Conservation Plan.

Given the scarce amount of seasonal rainfall in the San Simeon area and the prolonged severity of the existing California drought the current yet limited water resource available needs to be preserved in order to avoid 1) being out of water due to the lack of ability to replenish the aquifer or 2) creating a situation such that the water quality becomes intolerable and the SSCSD is unable to serve palatable water. In addition, the regulatory restriction in which well 3 is considered impacted by surface water when Pico Creek is flowing renders well 3 to be a less than adequate contingency plan when wells 1 and 2 are inoperable due to water quality.

ORDINANCE NO. 116

AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE SAN SIMEON COMMUNITY SERVICES DISTRICT REPEALING ORDINANCE NO. 112 AND ADOPTING A NEW ORDINANCE MANDATING USE OF RECYCLED WATER STRICTLY FROM THE SAN SIMEON COMMUNITY SERVICES DISTRICT'S RECYCLED WATER FACILITIES.

Whereas, the San Simeon Community Services District ("District") is a community services district duly formed under California Government Code Section 61000 et seq. to provide community services within the District's service area, including water, sewer and services; and

Whereas, the District owns and operates a Recycled Water system providing tertiary treated, disinfected Recycled Water for approved purposes to customers within its service area; and

Whereas, it is the objective of the District to continually focus on ways to improve and enhance the quality of service to its customers. In light of this objective, it is the policy of the District that Recycled Water shall be used within its service area wherever such use is economically justified, financially and technically feasible and is not detrimental to public health, safety, welfare, and the environment; and

Whereas, Recycled Water is available and useful and suitable for the uses being proposed.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Directors of the San Simeon Community Services District, san Luis Obispo County, California as follows:

Section 1: Recitals

The Recitals are true and correct and incorporated herein by this reference.

Section 2: Repealer

Ordinance No. 112 is hereby repealed in its entirety.

Section 3: Purpose

The District offers Recycled Water that is surplus to the needs of the Recycled Water customers within the District's service area for such uses outside the service area of the District by agreement with the retail water purveyor. The purpose of this Ordinance is to promote the conservation of the District's potable/drinking water resources and to ensure maximum public benefit from the use of District's Recycled Water supply by regulating its use in accordance with applicable federal, state and local regulations.

Section 4: Policy

Recycled Water supplies shall be used to the maximum extent possible for any approved use. This shall be accomplished through the collection and treatment of wastewater and the beneficial reuse of the resultant Recycled Water in compliance with applicable federal, state and local regulations.

Section 5: Recycled Water Uses

Where water is used for irrigation, fountains, commercial uses, industrial process purposes, landscape impoundment, wildlife habitat, recreational impoundment, and commercial laundry, the District may provide Recycled Water where technically and economically feasible.

However, each use must be approved on a case by case basis. Determination of the specific uses shall be in accordance with the treatment standards and water quality requirements set forth in Title 22, Division 4, Chapter 3 of the California Administrative Code and with the intent of this Ordinance to preserve the public health and upon approval of the State Water Resources Control Board Division of Drinking Water.

In addition, each use shall be subject to the availability of distribution facilities or the technical and economic feasibility of making such facilities available, as determined by the District.

All persons, customers, and properties served by the District seeking Recycled Water or any non-potable water shall be restricted and required to only utilize the Recycled Water from the San Simeon Community Services District's Recycled Water System.

Section 6: District's Liability

The District is not responsible for any condition of the Recycled Water itself, or any substance that may be mixed with or be in Recycled Water as delivered to any customer, except as required by Title 22 and applicable regulations. The District shall not be liable for any damage from Recycled Water, including that resulting from inadequate capacity, defective plumbing, broken or faulty services, or Recycled Water mains or any conditions beyond the control of the District.

Section 7: Compliance with Regulations

The District's Recycled Water shall be used in a manner that complies with all applicable federal, state, and local statutes, ordinances, regulations and other applicable requirements for the treatment level supplied, as determined by the District.

Section 8: Service Constraints

All service is contingent on the quantity and quality of Recycled Water available from District's facilities and shall be provided in accordance with this Ordinance and the terms of the Agreement between the District and the Customer.

Section 9: Distribution

The District reserves the right to control and schedule distribution as necessary to:

- 1) Maintain an acceptable working pressure
- 2) Safeguard the public health
- 3) Manage the availability of the Recycled Water supply
- 4) Construct, maintain, and operate facilities

Section 10: Metering & Charges For Service

All use shall be metered, and all customers shall be held responsible and charged for all Recycled Water passing through the meter(s). It is the policy of the District to price Recycled Water at a sufficient discount from the price of potable water to make the use of Recycled Water for irrigation and other suitable uses cost effective for new development, and result in savings sufficient to encourage existing customers of the District to convert existing uses to Recycled Water where appropriate. To accomplish this policy the Board of Directors will set the price of Recycled Water service at least 10% less than the price of potable water served by the District.

Section 11: Unauthorized Usage:

When the District has discovered an unauthorized use, the District shall, as appropriate, notify the California Department of Public Health of such unauthorized use. Repeated unauthorized usage shall be considered as tampering with District property and may result in the offender being charged and prosecuted.

Section 12: Notice of Violation and Penalties:

In addition to any other penalty permitted by law, if and when the District becomes aware of any violation of this Ordinance, a written notice shall be placed on the property where the violation occurred and/or mailed to the person who is regularly billed for the service where the violation occurs and to any other person(s), and/or home owner associations known to the District who is responsible for the violation or its correction.

Said notice shall describe the violation and order that it be corrected, cured and abated immediately or within such specified time as the General Manager determines is reasonable under the circumstances. Said notice shall constitute the first violation of the provisions of this Ordinance.

If said violation and order is not complied with, the General Manager may forthwith issue an administrative citation for the following amounts:

- 1. The notice of violation described above shall constitute the first violation of the provisions of this Ordinance with no fine amount attached.
- 2. The second violation of any provision of this Ordinance, within the same twelve month period beginning with the first violation, a fine in the amount of one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150.00) shall be added to the customer's and/or association's water bill.
- 3. The third violation of any provision of this Ordinance, within the same twelve month period beginning with the first violation, a fine in the amount of three hundred dollars (\$300.00) shall be added to the customer's and/or association's water bill.
- 4. The fourth violation of any provision of this Ordinance, within the same twelve month period beginning with the first violation, a fine in the amount of six hundred dollars (\$600.00) shall be added to the customer's and/or association's water bill.
- 5. The fifth violation of any provision of this Ordinance, within the same twelve month period beginning with the first violation, a fine in the amount of twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200.00) shall be added to the customer's and/or association's water bill.

Section 13: Severability:

If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, or phrase of this Ordinance is for any reason held to be invalid or unconstitutional by a decision of any court or competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance. The Board of Directors hereby declares that it would have passed this Ordinance and each and every section, subsection, sentence, clause, or phrase not declared invalid or unconstitutional without regard to whether any portion of the Ordinance would be subsequently declared invalid or unconstitutional.

Section 14: Effective Date:

This Ordinance shall take effect and be in full force and effect thirty (30) days after the date of its adoption.

Section 15: Publication:

A summary of this Ordinance shall be published in a newspaper and circulated in the District at least five (5) days prior to the Board of Directors' meeting at which the proposed Ordinance is to be adopted. A certified copy of the full text of the proposed Ordinance shall be posted in the District office. Within fifteen (15) days after adoption of the Ordinance, the summary with the names of those voting for and against the Ordinance shall be published again, and the District shall post a certified copy of the full text of such adopted Ordinance.

Our Basic Services will consist of performing an electrical design for this project. Our scope of work is as set forth below:

- I. The existing record drawings, furnished by your office will serve as our reference for existing conditions. If the record drawings are inaccurate or incomplete, and additional work is required to make measured drawings of or to investigate existing conditions that do not match the record drawings, we will inform you and request a modification for our services. Where concealed conditions prevent determining the accuracy of the record drawings we will rely on the record drawings.
- II. We will prepare Construction Documents consisting of drawings and specifications that reflect the following work:
 - A. New 200A, 480Y/277V, three-phase electrical service for the new building housing the RO and CIP skids. Service equipment will consist of a meter pedestal or wall mounted meter/main combination socket box located on the building exterior. We will provide you with information to allow the owner to prepare the application for service with PG&E.

RESOLUTION NO. 15-371

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE SAN SIMEON COMMUNITY SERVICES DISTRICT IMPLEMENTING A STAGE THREE WATER SHORTAGE PURSUANT TO THE DISTRICT'S WATER CONSERVATION PLAN

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors of the San Simeon Community Services District ("District") currently has a moratorium on new water connections within the District boundaries, originally established by Ordinance No. 61 and amended by Ordinance No. 63, Ordinance No. 66 and Ordinance No. 102; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Water Code Section 375 et seq., the Board of Directors may adopt a water conservation program to reduce the quantity of water used for the purpose of conserving the water supply of the District; and

WHEREAS, the District currently has a Water Conservation Plan adopted pursuant to Water Code Section 375 et seq., which is set forth in Ordinance No. 114; and

WHEREAS, on January 17, 2014, the Governor of the State of California declared a state of emergency (the "Proclamation") due to record dry conditions and concerns over the State's dwindling water supplies. The Proclamation states that "[I]ocal urban water suppliers and municipalities are called upon to implement their local water shortage contingency plans immediately in order to avoid or forestall outright restrictions that could become necessary later in the drought season;" and

WHEREAS, on April 25, 2014, the Governor proclaimed a Continued State of Emergency to exist throughout the State of California due to the ongoing drought; and

WHEREAS, on April 1, 2015, the Governor issued Executive Order B-29-15 directing the State Water Resources Control Board to work with local agencies to come up with ways to reduce water usage by twenty-five percent. The Order finds that severe drought conditions continue to present urgent challenges and that new expedited actions are needed to reduce the harmful impacts from water shortages and other impacts of the drought; and

WHEREAS, the domestic water supply for the District may be inadequate based upon the continued lack of precipitation and the current water levels in the aquifers that provide the domestic water supply for the District, and specifically that water levels in the Pico Creek are such that staff has determined that the available water supply may be insufficient to meet demand; and

WHEREAS, the District's Water Conservation Plan contained in Ordinance No. 114 contains Stage One, Two and Three water conservation measures and restrictions on the use of potable water; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors deems it necessary and appropriate to implement a Stage Three Water Shortage in order to protect the public health, safety and general welfare of the public.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the San Simeon Community Services District Board of Directors as follows:

- 1. Based upon the existing water conditions, as described above, and in presentations to the Board of Directors, the Board of Directors hereby finds that the demands and requirements of water consumers cannot be satisfied without threatening the water supply of the District to the extent that there may be insufficient water for human consumption, sanitation and fire protection.
- 2. Based on the District's existing conditions and on concerns regarding the anticipated prolonged drought conditions, the Board of Directors hereby implements a Stage Three Water Shortage pursuant to its Water Conservation Plan with water conservation measures as set forth in Ordinance No. 114 all of which the Board of Directors finds are necessary in order to protect the public health, safety and general welfare of the public.
- 3. Within five days from the date of this Resolution, the General Manager is hereby directed to provide notice to all water customers of the Stage Three Water Shortage conditions and water conservation measures by special mailing or by a notice inserted into the water/sewer bills. Notice will also be posted at the District Office, Chamber of Commerce, San Simeon Post Office and on the District website.
- 4. This Resolution shall take effect upon adoption.

Dear Charlie:

Thank you for the opportunity to work with the San Simeon Community Services District (SSCSD) on the environmental determination for the Potable Water Well Head Treatment Project. Based on our understanding, the project consists of the installation of a potable water treatment system to address increased chloride levels in the community water supply that have resulted from drought conditions and gradual sea water introduction at the community well fields. The chloride situation in the well field is drastically reducing the options for production of potable drinking water that has acceptable levels of chloride. The two main wells are impacted by the chloride levels and Well #3 is being relied upon almost solely by the SSCSD. It is also beginning to show elevated chloride levels.

The proposed project would install a well head treatment system on the well field discharge pipeline as it transitions from the potable water well site to the SSCSD distribution system and storage network.

The pipeline is an existing 8-inch diameter pipeline. Separate suction and discharge connections would be made on the pipeline located a few feet apart. Isolation valves will be installed to allow the SSCSD to isolate the system and the treatment process for maintenance and operation issues. The treatment system will connect to these two connection points.

The wellhead treatment system is comprised of an equipment skid mounted reverse osmosis treatment system. In addition, a clean in place (CIP) system will be provided that will allow for the cleaning of the reverse osmosis (RO) membranes which will be required from time to time to maximize performance.

Both systems will be skid mounted. Separately, the SSCSD will grade the site level (fairly level presently) and install reinforced concrete equipment pads that the treatment process will be mounted to. Storage tanks and a permeate tank will also be installed on pads around the site. The site will be located directly outside of the District office on a parcel that is owned by the District. A metal building will be installed over the treatment equipment skids to protect them from the environment.

The concentrate will be temporarily discharged into the sanitary sewer collection system which is located adjacent to the proposed treatment unit facility. In discussions with the Regional Water Quality Control Board, the SSCSD confirmed that the discharge of the brine to the wastewater collection system is an activity covered under their existing permit. The District wastewater treatment plant discharges the effluent from the community through an existing ocean outfall. The brine will be discharged through the outfall with the treated effluent.

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The wellhead treatment system will allow the District to operate their wells (Wells 1 and 2) continuously when there is a drought and the water levels are low and the chlorides are elevated. It will also allow the District the freedom from use of the Hearst well (Well 3) and the expenses associated with its use for blending.

The project would provide for the treatment of the water currently being utilized by the community. The project site is located directly adjacent to the existing SSCSD office on a previously disturbed, level pad used for District parking. Grading will be minimal, and no vegetation will be removed.

Although the project does not trigger the need for discretional land use permits, because the project is considered to be an action by a public agency that may have the potential to result in a direct or indirect physical change to the environment, the project is required to be reviewed under CEQA. However, because the project will be located completely within the previously disturbed parking area adjacent to the SSCSD office, will not result in the expansion of the current well field, will not include any earth disturbance or grading on native or undisturbed soils, and no vegetation will be disturbed, the project is determined to be categorically exempt under CEQA.

Categorical exemptions are made up of classes of projects that generally are considered not to have potential impacts on the environment. Categorical exemptions are identified by the State Resources Agency and are defined in the CEQA Guidelines. Specifically, Section 15301 of the CEQA Guidelines defines Categorical Exemption Class 1 for existing facilities. Categorical Exemption Class 1 consists of the operation, repair, maintenance, permitting, leasing, licensing, or minor alteration of existing public or private structures, facilities, mechanical equipment, or topographical features, involving negligible or no expansion of use beyond that existing at the time of the lead agency's determination. Because the proposed project is considered to be a minor addition to the existing community water system, the proposed Potable Water Well Head Treatment Project is determined Categorically Exempt from CEQA under the Class 1 Exemption.

Attached to this letter is a copy of the Notice of Exemption prepared for the proposed project. Upon certification of the Notice by the SSCSD Board of Directors, Oliveira Environmental Consulting LLC will file the Notice of Exemption with the County Clerk in order to reduce the statute of limitations for any challenge to the agency from 180 days to 35 days.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Board of Directors find as follows:

1. The Project consists of the minor alteration of an existing public facility.

- 2. The Project would result in the addition of potable water treatment equipment to the existing District water system and would not result in the expansion of the existing water service capacity nor would it result in increased water pumping.
- 3. The addition of the water treatment equipment would be completely within the footprint of the existing District office parking area.
